

Alumni Scholarship Criteria and Deadline

The members of the DSCC Alumni Association Board have established the Alumni Scholarship for deserving students. Preference will be given to children of paid members of the Dyersburg State Alumni Association. A 100 word or less essay must be completed on "Why you feel you deserve to be awarded the DSCC Alumni Association Scholarship." The student must maintain a minimum grade point average (GPA) of 2.0 and must be enrolled as a full time student. The scholarship may be retained for a maximum of four semesters as long as criteria are met each semester and funding is available. Charter Mem Presented DSCC Outstanding Alumni Award



Dyersburg State Community College (DSCC) honored Jennifer Tyler of Brighton and the late Franklin Bales of Dyersburg with the Outstanding Alumni Award March 29 inside the Student Center on the Dyersburg campus.

Luciana Shaw, president of the DSCC Alumni Association, along with Dr. Karen A. Bowyer, president of DSCC, presented the awards in front of 175 faculty and staff during the College's spring conference.

Tyler graduated from DSCC with an Associate of Science degree in Social Sciences in 2001, an Associate of Science degree in Criminal Justice in 2005 and an Associate of Applied Science degree in Justice Services in 2005. She also earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in Liberal Arts from Excelsior College in 2011, a Master of Arts degree in Education from Bethel University in 2012, and a Master of Arts degree in English from the University of Memphis is 2014. Jennifer also graduated from the Instructional Leadership Program from Bethel University in 2014.

Tyler worked as a receptionist at Brighton Family Medicine from 2005-2009 and began her teaching career at Munford High School in 2009 where she is currently employed as a College Preparatory English teacher. She serves on the faculty council of the National Honor Society, sponsors Key Club, handles alumni relations and serves as a liaison to city and county government and civic entities. She also teaches print and broadcast journalism to upper-level students. Tyler has also served as an adjunct faculty member teaching dual enrollment English classes through Dyersburg State Community College since 2013.

She is a member of the DSCC Alumni Association, The University of Memphis Alumni Association, the LeBonheur 101 Class of June 2017, and supports the Tiger Scholarship Fund. While attending DSCC, she was a member of the Student Government Association, Phi Theta Kappa Honor Society, Homecoming Court 1998 and 1999, and the dean's list.

"Dyersburg State provided me with a great environment for my first academic endeavor after high school," stated Tyler. "I feel like I have come full circle with the school as I look back on my involvement as a student, and look forward to continuing to teach students of my own as an adjunct faculty member."

Bales graduated from DSCC with an Associate of Applied Science degree in General Studies in 2015. He continued his education at Bethel University from fall 2015 through spring 2016 and then attended the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga in the fall of 2016.

Bales, a 6'4" forward from Halls High School, was a member of the DSCC men's basketball team from 2013 to 2015. He received Tennessee Community College Athletic Association (TCCAA) Academic Honors for the 2013-2014 and 2014-2015 academic vears. He was named a DSCC scholar-athlete for the 2013-2014 and 2014-2015 academic years for achieving a grade-point average (GPA) of 3.0 or higher. In 2014, he received DSCC's Most Improved Player Award and in 2015, he received the Best 3-Point Percentage and Best Free-Throw Percentage Awards as well as the Highest GPA Award amongst his teammates. Bales also received the 2014-2015 National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) Exemplary Academic Achievement Award for obtaining a GPA between 3.60 and 3.79.

Upon graduation at DSCC, Bales transferred to Bethel University where he was a member of the

men's basketball team. While there, he was named to the Southern States Athletic Conference All-Academic Team and to the dean's list for two semesters.


"DSCC gave Frank the opportunity to continue to play basketball and he loved every minute that he spent with the team," stated Paula Bales, Franklin's mother. "Due to the small size of Dyersburg State, he was able to get to know not only the professors he had in class, but also other faculty and staff. He also received an excellent background as evidenced by his academic performance when he transferred to a 4-year university."

Bales passed away Dec. 23, 2017, after a brave battle with cancer. DSCC President Karen Bowyer and Alumni President Luciana Shaw presented the Outstanding Alumni Award posthumously to Bales' family in his honor.





Don Myers Appointed VP of Institutional Advancement and Continuing Education at DSCC



Dr. Karen Bowyer, president of Dyersburg State Community College (DSCC), announced the appointment of Don Myers as the new vice president of institutional advancement and continuing education on Feb. 26.

"With over 20 years of experience in higher education, we are fortunate to attract Don to this position to help us enhance and grow our development efforts," stated Dr. Bowyer. "His experience with regional accreditation along with his institutional research and strategic planning skills will benefit DSCC's core mission."

Myers comes to DSCC from sister institution Southwest Tennessee Community College (STCC) in Memphis, Tennessee. During his time at STCC, he served as research analyst, associate director and most recently director in the department of engineering since 2007. He has taught as an adjunct instructor for architecture and developmental studies and mathematics since 2010; served as research technician of academic and student affairs from 2003 to 2007; served as the director of the academic resource center (ARC) from 2001 to 2003; served as the DUCKS tutor coordinator and professional tutor of the ARC from 1998 to 2001; and served as the DUCKS Scholarship student tutor of the ARC from

1996 to 1998. In these roles, he acquired a wealth of knowledge and experience in preparing institutional reports for state and national reporting agencies; budgeting and forecast planning; assisting with accreditations; assisting with grant writing and development; and creating academic curriculums.

Myers earned an Associate of Applied Science degree in Liberal Arts from Lakewood Community College (now Century College) in 1996; an Associate of Applied Science degree in Civil/Construction Engineering Technology from State Technical Institute at Memphis (now STCC) in 1998; an Associate of Applied Science degree in Architectural Engineering Technology from State Technical Institute at Memphis (now STCC) in 1999; an Associate of Applied Science degree in Geographic Information Systems from State Technical Institute at Memphis (now STCC) in 2000; a Bachelor of Professional Studies degree in Technical/Mathematical Education and Tutorial Services from the University of Memphis – University College in 2003; and a Master of Science degree in Leadership and Policy Studies from the University of Memphis – College of Education in 2006.

As the new vice president of institutional advancement and continuing education, Myers will be responsible for overseeing institutional research, public information, alumni relations and continuing education. He will assist the president of the College with the DSCC Foundation Board, grant development, institutional effectiveness, strategic planning, regional accreditation, and fundraising initiatives for the College's Annual Fund Campaign.

Dyersburg State Community College (DSCC) presented outstanding faculty and staff awards to five deserving employees at its annual spring conference March 29 at the Student Center on the Dyersburg campus.

Each year, members of the DSCC faculty and staff are invited to submit nominations for the Outstanding Faculty and Staff Awards. The recipients are chosen by a committee of past winners that represent various college departments. Community members and representatives from local organizations serve as presenters and contribute funds to sponsor plaques and monetary awards given to recipients.

The Outstanding Faculty Award, sponsored by Bill and Mary Adcock, was presented to Dr. Brigham Scallion of Bells, assistant professor of biology. Dr. Scallion earned a Master of Science degree in Cellular and Molecular Biology from the University of Memphis and a Doctor of Osteopathic Medicine degree from the University of Pikeville-Kentucky College School of Osteopathic Medicine. He has taught as a full-time instructor at DSCC since 2014. Dr. Scallion also serves as DSCC's chapter advisor for Phi Theta Kappa (PTK) Honor Society.

The Outstanding Adjunct Faculty Award, sponsored by Security Bank, was presented to Toya Howard of Dyersburg, adjunct instructor of orientation and early child-hood education since 2016. She earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Paralegal Studies from the University of Memphis and a Master of Science degree in Family and Consumer Sciences from the University of Tennessee at Martin.

Delta Health Care Services Grant Awarded to Dyersburg State

USDA Rural Development Announces \$476,280 Investment for Health Care Training

On April 13, the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Office of Rural Development announced the approval of the Delta Health Care Services Grant for \$476,280 to Dyersburg State Community College. The announcement was held inside the Student Center on the DSCC Dyersburg campus in front of over 50 legislators, community leaders and representatives from local businesses, industries and organizations.

"Not only will these funds provide state-of-the-art simulation equipment for our emergency medical services programs and new nursing labs, it will also allow DSCC to expand its paramedic to RN fast track program to the Dyersburg campus and develop a RN to Bachelor of Science degree in Nursing (BSN) partnership enrollment program with The University of Tennessee Health Sciences Center in Memphis," states Dr. Karen Bowyer, president of DSCC.

In addition, DSCC plans to achieve the overall goal of the grant by offering a CNA program in conjunction with Peabody High School; creating a pathway for advancement for RNs in northwest Tennessee; and providing job placement assistance to graduates with assistance from the American Job Centers.

The investment will be used to provide equipment and technical assistance, specifically for health care training in the rural areas of northwest Tennessee. It is designed to create a pipeline of rural health care workers to fill shortages currently present in the fields of emergency medical technicians (EMTs), advanced EMTs, paramedics, critical care paramedics, registered nurses (RNs) and certified nursing assistants (CNAs). In turn, the project will create entry points to health care professions and expand the access to primary health care for rural residents.

A grand processional opened the ceremony with music provided by the Dyer County High School Sound of the Choctaws Concert Band conducted by Justin Brown, director of bands. Reverend Cory D. Williams, senior pastor of Dyersburg Cumberland Presbyterian Church, gave the invocation. 
Closing remarks were made by Luciana Shaw, president of the DSCC Alumni Association. A reception honoring the graduates and their guests followed Commencement exercises.
